

Throughout the Easter season, we hear the story of the earliest Christian communities in readings from the Acts of the Apostles. We hear how the people grappled with what it meant to place their faith and trust in the Lord, understanding that doing so called them to live differently—to follow Jesus' way of love. This is more than a history lesson for us. As we hear how the people were drawn to Christ and learned to follow Jesus, we are invited to ask ourselves how fully we are taking the gospel to heart. Is Jesus our way, truth, and life? Do our daily actions announce the praises of the Lord?

Trust IN God

During a time of crisis or uncertainty, we may find ourselves struggling with fear and anxiety. This is a natural reaction. But St. Paul reminds us in his Letter to the Philippians to "have no anxiety about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God" (4:6). Then, he assures us, "the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (v.7). With steadfast prayer and thanksgiving then, we do our best to put our trust in the Lord.

Let our actions reflect the trust and peace that can only be found in Him. Stay close to Jesus and the Blessed Mother in prayer, asking that those who are suffering from the disease or from any related anxiety may find healing and peace.

This Sunday, May 10th, 2020 Fifth Sunday of Easter

First Reading — All peoples called by God will receive the gift of the Spirit if they repent and are baptized (Acts 2:14a, 36-41).

Psalm — The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want (Psalm 23).

Second Reading — Once we were like straying sheep; but now we have been returned to the shepherd, our guardian (1 Peter 2:20b-25).

Gospel — The shepherd leads the sheep out into pastures of abundant life (John 10:1-10).

We encourage all to read and reflect on the Biblical passages that will be proclaimed at Masses next week!

First Reading — The people of Samaria accepted the word of God preached by Philip: they received the Holy Spirit (Acts 8:5-8, 14-17).

Psalm — Let all the earth cry out to God with joy (Psalm 66)

Second Reading — Act with gentleness and reverence toward all, so that when you are maligned those who defame you will be the ones put to shame (1 Peter 3:15-18) or 1 Peter 4:13-16.

Gospel — I will not leave you orphans, but will come to you (John 14:15-21) or Jn 17:1-11a.

Archbishop Gomez tells Catholics to 'trust God's plan.'

On May 1, thousands of Catholics across the United States and Canada tuned in to participate in a livestreamed liturgy as Archbishop José H. Gomez celebrated a re-consecration of both countries to the Blessed Virgin Mary from the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels in Los Angeles. Archbishop Gomez reminded Catholics that Mary is the first model of courage: "Mary was the first person to consecrate herself to Jesus Christ, the first to offer her whole heart to do His will." He prayed that she would grant the same strength to everyone suffering from the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. Following the consecration, the Archbishop echoed Pope Francis' request that Catholics pray the Rosary during this month of Mary. "This is a beautiful suggestion to unite us spiritually in this time when we are still in quarantine in our homes," he said. "Maybe we can all offer this little gift to Mary in the month of May, finding time to come together every day, to pray the rosary in our families and in our homes." Our Lady of Fatima

May 13 celebrates the feast day of Our Lady of Fatima. In the spring of 1916, an angel appeared to a young girl, named Lúcia de Santos, from a small town of Cova Da Iria, near Fátima in Portugal. Along with Lúcia were her cousins, Francisco and Jacinta Marto. The angel instructed them to offer prayer and sacrifice and bring peace to their country. This was to prepare them for the coming of Our Lady the following year. In the following year on May 13, 1917, the three children saw a white cloud coming close to them and soon Our Lady showed herself dressed all in white. She asked them to come, every month for 6 months always on the 13th. Francisco was confused for he could not hear or see her. His sister told him, to say the Rosary, and he began to see and hear. Our Lady told them to pray the Rosary, and to make sacrifices, offering them for the conversion of sinners. On Our Lady's second visit in June, she asked the children to pray to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, asking for reparation of man's sins. And to ask for the Consecration of Russia. She asked Lúcia, to learn to read, for they were all illiterate. At this time, the three children, Lúcia 10, Francisco 8 and Jacinta 7 were shepherds and not expected to attend school. Our Lady showed a vision of Hell and gave directions to help sinners. Years later, Lúcia, met Pope John Paul I, while he was still Patriarch of Venice. He was very moved by his visit with Lúcia, and after he was elected Pope, he vowed to perform the Consecration of Russia as Our Lady of Fatima had requested. On the third visit, July 13th, Our Lady entrusted to the children with 3 Secrets. On August 13th, the Mayor forbid the three children to go to the cove, he threw them in jail, and even threatened them with hot burning oil, so that they would reveal the secrets to him. The skies turned colors and lightning could be heard as was normal for Our Lady's coming. The children were released without harm. Six days later the Lady of Fatima appeared before the children. She told the children to continue to pray the Rosary daily. She also instructed them to build two portable stands made for Our Lady of the Rosary. Lúcia, Jacinta and two other girls all in white dresses would carry one, and Francisco and three other boys would carry the other, in celebration of Our Lady of the Rosary. She told the children that on the last month, "I will perform a miracle so all will believe." On the next visit, Our Lady, instructed them to continue saying the Rosary and the war would end. There were at least 20,000 people who had come to witness the strange phenomena. Our Lady told the three that in October, Our Lord will come as well as St. Joseph and the Child Jesus, Our Lady of Sorrows and Our Lady of Mt. Carmel. On October 13, there was pouring rain and 75,000 people were trudging through mud to get a sight of Our Lady. Many were skeptics. The Lady appeared and the sun came toward her with many bright rays. As the crowd watched the rain stopped, it became warmer and the sun began to appear larger and larger as it came closer and closer to earth. The crowds were amazed and the sun could be viewed, straight on without any damage to their eyes. Suddenly, the sun began to twirl and moved closer, and then as people became frightened, the sun grew smaller and headed east. The people were amazed as they realized the muddy ground was now completely dry as were their clothes. The sign of the Cross was made three times over the earth by St. Joseph and the Infant Jesus. This vision became The Miracle of the Sun. And the children were told a Sanctuary should be built on that very spot. Our Lady of Fatima's main message was "You have seen hell where the souls of poor sinners go. To save them, God wishes to establish in the world, devotion to my Immaculate Heart. If what I say to you is done, many souls will be saved and there will be PEACE."

What's Happening in the Parish Office during this Pandemic Experience?

Here are some interesting stories from some of the employees. Enjoy them.

Fr. Leszek, Pastor - Three months ago, I had a calendar full of meetings, church activities, plans and travel. I was wondering and sometimes even worrying, how I would be able to do all that was scheduled for me to do. We just started a Called to Renew Capital Campaign in our Parish and I was busy like never before, but also happy and very satisfied that all these meetings were very successful. Three weeks later almost everything on my calendar had been cancelled. Almost everything in my daily routine, and in my life, was changed because life changed. I had to adjust to new realities, trying to make sense of it all, trying to organize my private and professional life in a new way, without the daily Masses with my parishioners in our Church, other prayer meetings, confession, appointments in my office, meeting our always happy students, coffee with friends and exercising in the gym. The world changed! And I had to change too! Although almost everything on my calendar had been cancelled, soon after though, it was filled with new scheduled activities and meetings. So no, I did not find the time to entertain Netflix! At the beginning of March together with the Search Committee, we started working tirelessly through late night zoom meetings, interviewing several candidates for our new school principal. I am incredibly happy that after 5 weeks of searching, we finally chose the best candidate. In the middle of March, after receiving the announcement from the Archdiocese that the public celebration of Mass had been suspended, I got very confused and I was not sure how to celebrate Masses and be connected to our parishioners. I did not have any experience how to live stream or record Masses and post them on our Website. Together with Fred and Chris, we finally learned how to do it. However, the experience of filming Masses can be weird, and it was at the beginning. Also, I doubted that there would be people eager to watch our Masses, since they had big choices to find online Masses from the Cathedral or other famous sources. However, the weirdness wore off as soon as I saw comments start to come in on Facebook. I noticed that there are a lot of our parishioners who have been happy and grateful to our Church for live streaming and recording Masses and posting them on our website and Facebook. I found out that this is a perfect way to stay connected to our parishioners in these challenging times. I have been celebrating Mass almost every day in our Chapel. Sometimes when we live stream Mass or record Mass to post it on our Website or Facebook, few people come, Chris, Angelica, Ken and during the week only one lector, usually Nora Jayne, but a lot of times, it's just me. It forces you to focus on what you are doing. You are praying to God here, we are worshiping God, we are adoring God. Sometimes, as priests, we can get too wrapped up in trying to entertain or impress people, but when you are alone, offering Mass for them, you are focused on God. We are all in this kind of weird place, where we are called to be a priest and pastor, but our people are not here. Although we assigned Theresa to make calls to our parishioners, and she does it perfectly, I have also started calling parishioners. I am trying to call at least our older parishioners who might be very lonely. I just call them, check-in, and see how they are doing. I ask if there is anything I can do for them. I want to let them know that they can call me anytime, even if they want a visit, I can go. We think social media can reach everyone, but it cannot. Not everyone is on it, and there is no substitute for a human voice and a real connection. The biggest frustration is, not being able to really interact with people. I try my best to stay connected to my Church, and God. I have written a few letters for all parishioners, and will continue to post on our Website and the bulletin. I want to lift your spirit and bring you all some encouragement. This Lent of 2020 we gave up much: travel, sports activities, eating out, visiting, freedom to shop, get a haircut, or go to school without possibly putting ourselves and others in danger. But the Lent of these deprivations has not ended at Easter. Some say it may last into the Fall. So, I am still adjusting and trying to use this challenging time in a good and productive way. Hope that the virus will exhaust itself. Hope that the social distancing will flatten that curve. Hope that the economy will come back. Hope that the lives lost will be lessened. And hope that this will somehow bring us closer to Jesus, that our faith will grow, and that we will realize the true importance of life — above and beyond material things. So, do not lose hope. Things ARE going to get better. But in the meantime — walk in faith — not fear. Believe God's Word. It may be necessary to renew your commitment and devotion to the Lord; you may have to dive into the Word like never before to find God's promises; you may have to spend more time on your knees in prayer to hear God's assurances — but you will.
