

LA Catholic schools to keep 'distance learning' through end of school year

Catholic schools throughout Los Angeles, Ventura and Santa Barbara counties will continue with distance learning through the end of the 2019-2020 academic year, the Department of Catholic Schools (DCS) of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles told parents, students, and staff May 9. "After recent discussions with public health officials in the three counties we serve, public and private K-12 campuses will not be included in the initial stages of sector reopening. As a result, distance learning will continue through the end of the school year," said Paul Escala, Senior Director and Superintendent of Catholic Schools for the Archdiocese of Los Angeles. Professional training is being provided by the Department of Catholic Schools for teachers and principals to prepare them for all aspects of distance learning including caring for students, and preparing for the upcoming academic year. "Our leaders are preparing for the future when it is deemed safe for our students, faculty and staff reenter and reintegrate back into our campuses," said Escala, who also announced the formation of a "Starting the School Year Smart joint task force" to offer guidance "based on best practices, adaptable to meet individual school circumstances and flexible to ensure compliance with state

Mary, May and the Rosary!

The Rosary: The spiritual sword of Mary Did you know that when Mary gave the rosary to St. Dominic in 1208, she told him that it was a *weapon against the forces of*

darkness? It's true. After that event, the Dominicans and almost all other religious communities began to wear the rosary as part of their religious habit. Even today, almost all religious communities that have the rosary as part of their habit wear it on their left side to signify that it is a sword ready to be

"unsheathed" and taken into spiritual battle. Throughout history there have been numerous others who have championed the rosary and helped spread it to the ends of the earth. There are even papal champions of the rosary, like St. Pope Pius V. This incredible Pope is responsible for saving Western civilization from Islamic takeover, and he did it through the rosary and a Holy League of men willing to defend Christianity. Other papal champions of the rosary, such as Pope Leo XIII and St. Pope John Paul II, wrote important documents on the rosary and helped spread the devotion far and wide. Pope Leo XIII wrote 11 encyclicals on the rosary, and St. John Paul II re-sharpened the ancient blade of the rosary by turning it into a modern-day light saber by offering the Church the Luminous Mysteries. History has also witnessed saints like St. Louis de Montfort and St. Anthony Mary Claret champion the rosary. St. Louis de Montfort wrote one of the greatest books ever written on the rosary, and St. Anthony Mary Claret mandated that every priest in his diocese pray the rosary with their parishioners on Sundays and solemnities. For his zeal in promoting the rosary, Our Lady appeared to St. Anthony Mary Claret on several occasions and declared him the

"new St. Dominic." St. Josemaria Escriva also wrote a magnificent book on the rosary, while St. Pio of Pietrelcina and St. Teresa of Kolkata gave witness to the blessed beads by almost always having a rosary in their hands. One of the most amazing stories of the power of the rosary is from a man who was once an ordained satanic priest. Blessed Bartolo Longo was from Naples. Italy, and after his radical return to Catholicism — which he attributed to the rosary — he began construction on what would become the famous shrine of Our Lady of the Rosary of Pompeii. His love for Jesus and Mary knew no bounds, and he also initiated many works of mercy to help orphans, widows and the sick. Then

there's the Servant of God Frank Duff, founder of the world's largest Marian apostolate, the Legion of Mary. He required all members to pray the rosary. Mao Tse-tung, the Communist leader and father of the People's Republic of China, once referred to the Legion of Mary as "public enemy number one." (Courtesy of the Angelus - www.angelus.com)

SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER - As Jesus prepared the apostles for the time when he would no longer be with them physically, and knowing that they would face hardship, trials, and persecution in the future, he promised them an Advocate, the Holy Spirit. Through baptism that same Spirit dwells within us, always with us to guide us in the truth of God's love and strengthen us so that we may know Christ and live as Christ's people. Now, as in every time, God knows it is not always easy to live as a Christian. With the assurance of the Holy Spirit's presence, we find the grace to love Jesus and to keep the Lord's commandments.

STRENGTHENED TO LIVE AS CHRIST'S OWN - We might look at the world around us and conclude that this is the most challenging time in history during which to live as a person of faith. Yet we know this is not so. Throughout the ages, people of faith have faced mockery, persecution, and even death as a result of their commitment to Christ. Still, it is important for us to acknowledge the challenge of living as a Christian today, when faith is viewed with ambivalence at best, and often with antagonism. Some do not understand how faith and reason can sit side by side, even though many of the world's greatest scientific discoveries have been made by people of faith. Others see the failures of the Church or its leaders and discount faith as a result. We rely on the powerful presence of the Holy Spirit to be with us when we are mocked or simply misunderstood on account of our faith in Jesus Christ. Through the Holy Spirit, we will find the grace to live with conviction as Christian people.

THE REASON FOR OUR HOPE - Saint Peter admonishes us, "Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope." One of the greatest gifts of faith in our lives is our hope in Christ Jesus. Through Christ, we keep our eyes on the wider view of life here on earth and everlasting life with God. We know that the trials and challenges of today do not have the final word, and do not have power over us. With the presence of the Advocate, we have the help we need to live as God directs and desires, so that the world might come to know Christ through the witness of our lives. This is a hope-filled, meaningful way of life. When so much of our surrounding culture speaks of impermanence and momentary distractions, we have the hope of meaning and purpose today and the promise of eternal life to come.

Saint Anastasia was born in 281 A.D. and became a perfect symbol of peace, humanity, and solidarity. Her Feast Day is December 25th. She is a symbol of dialogue and collaboration. In her spirit, and in the spirit of love, we welcome all to the Catholic Community of St. Anastasia Catholic Church.



St. Rita of Cascia – St. Rita of Cascia was born around 1381, as Margherita Lotti, in a small suburb of Umbria, Italy. In a Parish Church in Belgium, there is a statue of Rita with bees around her head. A story is told, that the day after her Baptism, her family noticed a swarm of white bees flying around her crib as she slept. The bees were peacefully entering and exiting her mouth. Her parents weren't afraid, they believed that Rita was destined to be virtuous and devoted to God. Rita wanted to enter the convent, but instead, her parents arranged for her to be married to provide safety and security, to a man named, Paolo Mancini. Rita became a wife and mother at only 12 years of age. Her husband was cruel and had a bad temper and often became angry and mistreated, Rita, verbally and physically. Paolo Mancini pursued other women and had many enemies. But, Rita's influence eventually helped him to become a better man. Paolo Mancini's family had a feud for many years with the Chiquis family, but he renounced

the feud, and when things heated up again, Paolo was killed by one of his allies who betrayed him. After her husband's death, Rita forque his murderers, but Paolo's brothers sought revenge and Rita's two sons joined the feud. The sons became like their father when he was young. Rita tried to stop her sons, before they lost their souls, by committing murder. Rita prayed to God, asking him to take her sons before they committed a mortal sin. One year later, they both died from dysentery. After the death of her sons, Rita attempted to enter the Monastery of St. Mary Magdalene in Cascia, but they refused her. Although she was prayerful, with a good character, the Order feared her connection with her husband's family feud. They told Rita she could only enter by mending the feud, between the Mancini's and the Chiquis family. Rita prayed to St. John the Baptist, St. Augustine and St. Nicholas to help her end the feud. The Bubonic plaque was spreading through Italy at the time, and when Bernard Mancini became infected, he finally ended the feud with the Chiquis family. Rita was now allowed to enter the Monastery at age 36. Catholic legends tell us, that she was transported, by her three helpful saints, at night, into the garden courtyard by way of levitation. Rita was faithful and received the

sacraments often. She followed the Augustinian Rules and had a great devotion to the Passion of Christ. When she was 60 years old, she asked, "Please let me suffer like you, Divine Savior." Soon after, a deep wound appeared on her forehead, that never healed and gave her much pain the rest of her life. It was like a partial stigmata, as if a thorn had pierced her forehead. Near the end of her life, she was bedridden with Tuberculosis. One day she asked her cousin to bring a rose from the family garden. It was January, and her cousin didn't expect to find any roses. But there was one, single, rose in bloom, which she brought back to Rita. Rita passed away four months later, on May 22, 1457. Following her death, she was buried at the Basilica of Cascia. Later they found her body to be incorrupt. So they proceeded to build a shrine and they moved her to the Saint Rita Shrine in Cascia. Her body can be seen even to today at the Shine. Rita is known, as, "The Saint of Impossible Cases." She is shown with a wound on her head holding a rose or surrounded by bees. In some images, she carries a crucifix or a palm leaf with three thorns representing her husband and two sons. She is also patron of difficult marriages and parenthood, sterility, loneliness, abuse victims, the sick, and wounds. She was canonized by Pope Leo XIII in 1900.
