FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Greetings in Christ the Savior!

Today marks the first Sunday in the New Church Year that we call Advent. Although we celebrate this season each year, many are not sure what the season is all about. The word "Advent" from Latin "adventus", means "coming" or "arrival." It is the manifestation of something long-awaited. It is a time that we reflect on Israel's promised savior and remember his birth, as well as anticipate his return. It is a time of joyous remembrance and eager anticipation. Advent is the time that we look back to the birth of Jesus and look forward at the same time. The liturgical color of Advent is purple, which suggests that there is a certain penitential dimension to this season. It is a time of devotion and waiting, of repentance and faith in the promised messiah of Israel.

2000 years ago, John Baptist was baptizing in the wilderness and preaching a baptism of repentance for the remission of sins. "Prepare the way of the LORD; Make His paths straight." We live in a day and age in which such a word may not necessarily be fashionable, yet it's as needed now as it was in John's Day. While the people anticipated the presence of the Messiah, John prepared their hearts for His presence with a powerful message. This message was that before His presence, there must be repentance.

Even today, we celebrate the coming of our Lord and Savior to earth as a baby. Yet, as He lived and died for our sins, He wants us to come to Him with humble and repentant hearts. We too are called to "prepare the way" for Christ to enter the hearts of people around us. Our friends and families are looking for the reality of changed lives. Not perfect lives but changed lives! Part of "preparing the way" is removing the obstacles that would keep people from getting to Jesus. These obstacles could be anything that would cause their focus to shift away from Christ.

I would ask that you pray during this time that God will help you to be one who "prepares the way" for the Messiah to impact lives around you. Pray that God will use you to bring honor and glory to not just the babe in the manger, but our soon, coming King!

Dear brothers and sisters, I pray that our Advent this year may be a grace-filled time for you and your families, and that you may experience all the blessings of Him, who is the Prince of Peace. Let's prepare the way!

WATCHFUL CONFIDENCE

We the Church enter into Advent and the New Liturgical Year with a call for a watchful confidence. Our readings were originally addressed to communities undergoing great loss and confusion. Jeremiah speaks confidently of God fulfilling the ancient promises to Israel, even during a time of foreign invasion. Paul speaks of God leading the Church into holiness, while the community longs for the coming of Jesus. In the Gospel passage from Luke, Jesus speaks of powerful signs and of great confusion to come, but emphasizes that we may look forward knowing that God brings not cause for despair, but hope. We celebrate Advent to remind each other of God's faithfulness. We are to be watchful, to see how God is stirring up our world. God disturbs both our pride and our complacency, and brings us healing and justice. We prepare ourselves to welcome Jesus, confident that God indeed fulfills all these divine promises.

Jesus reminds us in the gospel to be vigilant and pray. So, let's make this time of Advent, a time of intentional prayer.

What is Advent?

The season of Advent (from the Latin word "adventus," meaning "coming") is the time of preparation for the birth of Christ.

Why Advent?

It is a time of longing and waiting for his 'coming'. It should be a time filled with joy, when we ponder the gift of God's love, open our hearts to receive, and open our hands to give. Advent begins the Liturgical Year. It begins on the Sunday closest to the last day in November.

How can I prepare my home and my heart?

We invite you to create a prayer space in your home where you have an Advent wreath and a handmade manger. You can get as creative as you'd like to make it a prayerful experience. Every week, place a written intention/petition on a strip of paper and place it in the manger before lighting the Advent candle. On Christmas Day, place baby Jesus in your manger of collected prayers and intentions, where we will rejoice in the coming of Emanuel. Gather with a family member or friend. The first candle we light, during Advent, is the candle of HOPE. As you reflect on the intention you wrote down on the paper, what is the hope for that intention? Example: I hope for healing of my family member. Have a conversation with a family member or friend about the intention. In what way do you want Jesus to intercede for this intention?
